






























































Forest school: guiambany

"Forest School flips the traditional classroom setting on its head offering children an alternative way to learn that uses the great outdoors as the classroom and nature and all it has to offer as their learning instrument.

Forest School aims to raise children's self-awareness and self-esteem, offering them opportunities to achieve and develop confidence through hands on learning experiences in nature. It offers children the opportunity to initiate learning, take risks and make choices. It also helps them to understand and care for the natural environment"



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The children all got the opportunity to go for a nature walk today. We had so much fun enjoying the sun, fresh air, new environment and the lake. We started off our walk by holding hands with our friends and educators. Kitty and Torvin were best friends, walking together very nicely. The walk helped us to practice our gross motor skills, build our confidence and appreciate the outdoors.













We went down to the lake and sat in a circle. We then did our Acknowledgement of Country, feeling the land beneath us. Shanza was very good at remembering the actions. We had fun collecting sticks, rocks and leaves that we found. We then went down to the water and threw some of our special treasures in. Esca was very excited to throw rocks into the water and Honglin giggled and babbled saying "water" A swan swam over to say hello and Shanza and Oscar pointed excitingly. Torvin said "Quack! Quack!". Afterwards we took a secret passage through the trees and came to a nice area of grass. We ran with confidence, chasing each other whilst giggling.













We came to an area with donut shaped sculptures and a rock wall. Archie and Henry picked up leaves and threw them over the rock wall, giggling and babbling while they did so. Archie ran after the birds with excitement and Honglin yelled "birdy, birdy". Honglin and Henry both found big sticks and dragged them as they ran, they were so excited to do this that they laughed and laughed while running. We saw an airplane in the sky and Shanza said "airplane!". Always so well spoken Shanza! The fresh air and open clearing made us all very happy and we used our imaginations to have fun. Mady chased us while we ran away laughing and we did twirling on the spot, sometimes falling over but always jumping back up and giggling. Titi lifted us into the donut shaped sculptures and we all posed for photos when inside. So much fun!











We walked down a hill and came across some bright yellow balancing beams. Torvin went first and when he got to the end, shouted "more! more!" with a big smile and ran back to do it again. Honglin, Oscar, Shanza and Archie all followed confidently and successfully crossed, then ran back to the start with excitement. We are so braye! Our gross motor skills are so good that we are able to walk across all on our own. Mady walked across holding Kit so she could see how to balance and afterwards with Titi's support, Kit walked across the beam. We are so proud! Henry had fun scooting and crawling a bit of the way and Elodie showed confidence when Mady sat on the beam and said "walk to me" she decided to take a few steps before reaching her educators safe arms.











Eranga helped us to organise morning tea on our mat. We all sat nicely together and gobbled down our food after all the running around, we were excited to eat. Kit and Shanza were very good friends smiling at each other and pointing to the birds in the sky, so cute girls. It was so lovely to eat outside and appreciate the nature all around us. We listened to Mady as she explained to us that the air that we breathe, is gifted to us by our wonderful trees and we should always take care of them. On the way back, we saw buses, cars, bikes and birds which we recognised. We love recreating our own Forest School. Seeing the flora and fauna and learning as we go is an amazing experience and it is already building up our confidence and knowledge so much.













We started our walk with the Acknowledgement of Country and some stretching. We raised our hands high before twisting our bodies. We walked up towards the carpark before Nikki asked the children what the red sign means. "STOP" Honglin said before we all showed our stop signs.























Outdoor play also enables children to enjoy the natural environment and learn to seek out exercise, fresh air, and activity. There is something fundamentally healthy about using the outdoors. Thus outdoor play develops the children's disposition for the outdoors, for physical activity, and for care of the environment





Wombat STEW! We gathered on the mat to read Wombat Stew. We read about the dingo making the stew using all different ingredients. Marco recognised the fire and emu. Shanza said "Wombat stew" as we sang. Honglin noticed the water and said turtle for the lizard. Yuna stuck her tongue out like a lizard.



















We continued our walk over to the rock climbing wall, all children challenged their motor skills as they used their problem solving skills to find the best route up the wall. Honglin, Zelin and Oscar moved super fast up the wall. Oscar clapped his hands when he reached the top celebrating his achievement. Marco made large leg and arm movements climbing from rock to rock. Shanza used all her strength to get up the wall, she showed educators she was proud by smiling once she reached the top.



The 'Forest School' concept originated in Scandinavia, where schools use local woodland areas to hold outdoor activities which foster children's problem-solving and cooperation skills, as well as their confidence and self-esteem. Their initial findings suggest that engaging in a Forest School can contribute to the development of collaborative learning skills, by encouraging children to work with others on challenging outdoor activities.

Getting dy to go on our walk we spoke about a couple of important things we needed to think about... We made sure we had our listening ears on, remembered that we needed to stay with the group and we needed to act safely when around roads. We practised doing the stop sign with our two hands in front of us and agreed that when educators do this, we need to stop walking and wait.

These are some vital instructions that we work on whilst on walks outside the centre and we recommend you do it when out and about with your child.


















































Today is World Environment Day, so the Toddlers decided to go for a walk around the Heritage environments. We began the morning by stretching our bodies and acknowledging our country. On our way out we dropped off our food scraps from morning tea to the community compost bin. Our current 'responsibilities' program promotes sustainability practices. Therefore we are encouraging children to become familiar with the act of composting every day. Before leaving Heritage we talked about being safe on roads and out on walkways. We practised doing our stop sign hands, and using our walking feet. Throughout our walk we explored our environment by rock climbing and balancing along beams. We had lots of fun throwing rocks into the lake. Henry V told everybody "rocks sink, and sticks float!"













During our walk we stopped and read a book about practicing to "reduce, reuse, recycle, and rethink!" Ava mentioned that "paper comes from trees" and Henry V added "we can reuse drink bottles or put them in the recycling bin." This activity is encouraging children to care for and sustain our environment.

As the weather continues to warm up, the Toddlers are getting more active and taking on the fun of walks around ANU! When asked, Joni told Kirsty he'd like to go to the 'donuts' today (a toddler favourite) so off we went, what a lovely day Toddlers:)





The older Preschoolers went on an impromptu excursion today to deliver two little stray kittens to the RSPCA. A stray mother cat has been living under the back deck and we found the kittens this morning snuggled up on the couch on the back deck. We haven't managed to get hold of the mum yet but fingers crossed we can catch her and reunite her with her kittens at the RSPCA.







"RSPCA Australia believes that animals must be treated humanely. Where humans make use of animals or interfere with their habitat, they should bestow a level of care befitting human dignity as rational, intelligent, compassionate beings, and a level of care merited by the nature of the animal as a sentient creature capable of responding to human care and attention. Such care should be marked by sympathy, consideration, compassion and tenderness towards animals."







It was soon lunch time so we drove the mini bus into the Molonglo Valley area to search for a picnic spot. And boy did we find a beauty. After a decent walk down the side of a hill just off residential area, the Preschoolers encountered a bridge and a big sign. "What does that say?" they asked before trying to work out the message for themselves. There was talk about swimming in the water and floods and lots of safety recommendations about not going in the water when it is over the bridge or you might get washed away. We talked about the safest way to cross the bridge and Stan suggested "stay in a line", Ava said "stay with the teacher", and Chester suggested "stay in the middle". So that's exactly what we did to cross the bridge safely. Following lunch, the Preschoolers were very excited to go exploring to see what they could find. A ranger was working nearby and she told the Preschoolers she was checking the bridges weren't blocking the fish from passing.

Thorns were a bit of an issue with a little spike here or there but that didn't stop the explorers from navigating the challenging terrain. It was hard to walk and climb over the different sized rocks, branches and other natural parts of the environment but it was so much fun! Chester, Gio and Stanley found what appeared to be the remains of a little fire and they were also very keen to see more water and climb to higher ground.



























The remaining children joined as they finished lunch and were also very excited to discover different parts to play and climb. One comment made by Ella when we first chose the spot summed up the ambience perfectly. She said "it's so peaceful here". Having the picnic lunch also provided a good opportunity to chat about all the healthy foods in our lunchboxes. We linked healthy eating to growing up strong and having the energy to do lots of exploring and discovering. This helped children make positive choices about eating what they otherwise might not have.







It was soon time to head back up to the bus so the Preschoolers gathered their belongings, had a big drink of water and headed back across the bridge. We went over the rules for crossing the bridge that we set on the way over to make sure everyone was safe.



At the end of the talk Tabitha promised to keep in contact and let us know how the owl was doing, she even let us name the owl. We all agreed "Heritage the owl" was the best name.




Then we stopped for a short time at the spirit level sculptures where we did some balancing and found a huge bull ants nest.



Jenny sang the song 'London Bridge is falling down' in Chinese. She had assistance from her daughter Xiaoling! Torvin smiled lots enjoying this group time as we sang a song about a Chinese dumpling. We learned about Chinese Zodiac signs and animals as Torvin began babbling. Noah folded up his piece of paper, and babbled with Evelyn. As we sang songs Noah moved his body left and right as he clapped his hands. Next we looked at a Chinese envelope which Jenny explained that children receive for Chinese New Year. The children were very interested in checking this out!

We set up our garden for an Easter egg hunt. Chloe and Eranga hid eggs first, and the children came out with their basket. Yun filled two baskets, Archie and Elodie tried really hard to open up the chocolate when they found their first one. We hope all Nursery families enjoyed the baskets they made today.

















Eranga and Chloe took some children down to see the chickens and do the compost. On their trip down there, Noah found some rocks and decided to start collecting them. Honglin and Oscar lead the group with their buckets. Honglin decided to hop like a bunny!! When they reached the chicken coop, there were no chickens so Marco said "All gone". They found an egg inside the coop and mummy chicken popped her head out. Torvin was very excited because he found three big watermelons.













































As we approach Easter, the Preschoolers have been participating in a variety of egg based activities and experiences. Today they were magical eggs that hatched into different animals described by Alicia based on physical characteristics. For example, an animal with big ears and a long trunk. The eggs hatched and then imitated the movement and sounds of that animal. Fionn then took on the role of Easter Bunny and delivered an egg to the Preschoolers from his basket which contained something inside that the Preschoolers needed to count; another one to one correspondence activity building on from the munching dinosaurs yesterday. Some children shook their eggs to guess what was inside while others popped them open straight away to find 2D shapes, the same used by Tina yesterday.









The Preschoolers counted how many shapes they had (ranging from 3-7 in each egg) and then were able to choose another egg out of the basket. Strategies to support accurate counting were suggested such as lining shapes up or moving each one across to a pile as they were counted. The next egg was popped open and also counted, and then the two groups were combined where the total number were counted. This allowed educators to look at simple addition as well as counting past ten with some children.




























Learn Chinese With TINA

Teaching language (especially a second language) requires a holistic approach and a wide range of strategies to support different learners. Our amazing educator Tina has been taking her Mandarin sessions to new levels this year using routines, hands on group experiences, set up environments, and spontaneous conversations to support a wide range of abilities. Tina not only shares her own knowledge but also encourages our confident Chinese speakers to help their peers, which has fostered a whole community of learners within Heritage, particularly our Preschool room.







Tina read the poem 'Walk to a village' with the Preschoolers which incorporates already familiar numbers and characters in Mandarin. Props add another fun element and are a regular feature of sessions. Everyone learnt to say "younger sister is sleeping, big sister is quietly playing". A toy rabbit was also used when saying "little rabbit loves to eat carrots and vegetables".

We talked about how we could show our mum/dad how much we love them. "Kiss them" said Ona, "hug" yelled Janthra, "be good" added Derek. Tina then discussed how sharing things with our parents can show our love for them. The Preschoolers learnt how to say I'm sharing half my apple for mum/dad.













We continue to look at different shapes in Chinese. The children created their own houses from a variety of sticks, straws and popsicle sticks. They were very proud of the different houses they had made.

Learn about Fruits













We practised saying different fruit and vegetables such as strawberry, plum, watermelon, capsicum, eggplant, pear, pomegranate, grapes, apples, banana, tomato and carrot. Each chose their own fruit and then named the fruit to their friends in Chinese. They also described their fruit or vegetable as either sweet 甜 (tián) or sour 酸 (suān). Afterwards they had a try of a persimmon 柿子 (shizi), which is a sweet fruit, that is sometimes dried. It was interesting to see how some of the children described the persimmon as sweet and some described it as sour, but most of them enjoyed it and asked for more.







Our bi-linguists and in some cases tri-linguists selected a piece of fruit to offer to the little pig (xiǎo $zh\bar{u}$). The Preschoolers selected a piece of fruit, learnt the name in Chinese and then the pig said "I'm hungry, give me something to eat". So the Preschoolers would feed the pig the piece of fruit saying "little pig please eat strawberry" (nǐ hǎo xiǎo $zh\bar{u}$, qǐng chī cǎo méi).

Numeracy and Literacy in Chinese





The Mandarin program had a 2D shape and 3D object focus today and involved counting the number of edges/sides and corners (vertices). The Preschoolers also began learning the names of shapes including triangle, square and rectangle.

Tina's Mandarin session began with counting from 1-10 using English numerals and then switching to Chinese symbols. This counting was then extended all the way to 29! Then they began to count animals in Chinese and some of the children were able to do this independently.

























What's the Time Preschoolers??? Our Preschoolers are becoming amazing at reading the time with Tina in Mandarin. It's great to hear so many children responding to her questions.













Tick-Tock more clocks! Tina brought in even more clocks for the Preschoolers to examine which also included **shou biao** (watches). As Tina rotated the big hand around the yellow clock, the Preschoolers repeatedly said **zou** (walk) together. We were pretending to walk to Floriade. When the big hand returned to the 12, Tina asked **ji dianle?** (what time is it?) and the Preschoolers would announce what time it was. For example, **sì dian** (4 oçlock).







Music plays a big role in a child's early life and development. We use lullabies to rock our babies to sleep, dance to rhythmic tunes with them, and even use songs to teach basic concepts such as the alphabet. In fact, early childhood programs always include music and movement activities in their classes. Their Children's Music Programme supports the Ministry of Education's emphasis on developing children's music and physical abilities at a young age.

- 1. Music helps develop language, literacy and communications skills.
- 2. Music enhances physical development.
- 3. Music helps develop cognitive skills.
- 4. Music enhances individual development.
- 5. Music's form and structure can bring order and security.
- 6. Music encourages early brain development.
